Last month's club event, the WCC Craft Show, held the weekend beginning Friday the 14th started slowly. Set-up went flawlessly and was done by the time I arrived. We can thank Norm Mancuso for some nice photos of our clubs booth set-up.

Dave Eaton announced that he had applied for an Educational Opportunity Grant for our chapter from AAW. They have awarded us \$1200 for the purpose of new lathes for demos and/or Learn & Turn.

Joe McGill described the May newsletter as "sparse" and again asked the members to please submit publishable content. In the past the newsletter has carried reviews of library books and DVDs, which many members have found helpful. Also, the newsletter accepts classified ads.

Charlie Croteau again thanked the members for their Project Goodwill donations. The Free Wheelchair mission continues to help people worldwide and our contributions help. Charlie was recently involved in one of their trips to Chile (he showed photos from the trip at the end of the business meeting).

Ray Asselin has developed a new catalog/signout process for our DVD library.

Thanks to Jerry Sambrook for getting the CNEW store set up with a starting inventory of pen kits. These pens are "fancy slimline" style with a durable titanium nitride finish, and use 7mm bore/mandrel. Pricing is one for \$4, five for \$18, or ten for \$35.

Reid Gilmore is organizing CNEW's booth at the Worcester Center for Craft's fair May 14-16. Hours will be Fri 2-7, Sat 10-5, Sun 11-4. Booth setup will be on the afternoon of Thurs May 13. We will need to move the booth materials from Peter Wilcox's house where they are now stored to the assigned space in the Center's library. There will also be an opportunity for CNEW to demonstrate turning, but this will be in a separate outdoor space.

Charlie Croteau is again organizing a visit to Sean Robert's woodworking in Gilbertsville. This will be 10 AM on Saturday May 8.

Dave Eaton gave an update on the Worcester Center for Crafts. They are open, but still waiting for grants to finish updating the wood shop. Their 1st session of woodturning classes was cancelled due to low enrollment. Sign-up for the next round of classes is ongoing. The rooms we used to meet in can no longer be consistently scheduled for us and have been reconfigured with less open space. It is possible that we could arrange to meet in their lobby area at a cost of \$150 per month, with the possibility of using their lathes subject to availability, which will vary month-to-

month.

There are opportunities to volunteer at the national symposium this summer. Angelo lafrate is seeking help with the auction. Art Bodwell is a demo room team leader and has many demo room helper slots to fill.

Dave Eaton will purchase 4 face shields for use in our Learn & Turns.

Special thanks to Todd Heino and Kevin Nee; they took charge of building a cabinet for the church where we meet. More help is needed in this area - contact Todd and Kevin if you would like to be involved.

Rick Angus will be the instructor for the woodturning shop portion of an Elderhostel event at Snow Farm in Williamsburg, MA June 6-12. Cost is in the \$600 to \$700 range for the week.


