

SEGMENTED WOODTURNERS SYMPOSIUM

The Segmented Woodturners is a virtual club of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) and at approximately 270 members worldwide, is the largest club by membership in the AAW. The club functions around its website, www.segmentedwoodturners.org.

I just returned from the 4th biennial Segmented Woodturners Symposium in San Antonio, Texas. With 184 attendees, it was the largest segmented symposium yet, with attendees from as far away as Australia and the U.K.

Beyond the list of talented and some very well known demonstrators, the major thing that struck me and after talking to others, they felt the same, is how far segmented woodturning has advanced in the last ten or so years.

It wasn't long ago segmenting was dominated, and rightly so, by the "name" turners such as Tibbetts, Theobald, Bill Smith in open segmenting and others. These people wrote books, produced videos and generously shared their knowledge. This led to turners gravitating to segmenting, and the quality and ingenuity of these new segmenters is staggering.

The instant gallery this year was far and away the best ever, and most of the pieces were by "ordinary" turners, not just "name" turners.

The club and website was conceived and championed by Malcolm Tibbetts, with the help of many others and has motivated many to not only create quality work, but a multitude of new methods and techniques that allow all to stretch the limits of creativity in segmented woodturning. These "new" segmenters are sharing, as did others before them, their techniques and ideas on the website and in the symposiums. The number of turners posting photos and techniques on the website forum and gallery has increased dramatically to the point where the "name" segmenters are far outnumbered and this has only served to greatly advance the art form.

The gallery on the website is open for viewing by non-members and I would urge all to check it out and see some of the amazing work that is being created by ordinary people.



SHOP TIPS

Removing Dimples

I think most of us novice turners have problems with dimples at the center of the inside bottom of boxes and other turnings. Here is a simple tool and process that will help to eliminate dimples.

Remove Dimple in Bottom of Boxes



The drawing above illustrates the dynamic of a rotating piece as well as the cutting tool in relation to a dimple on the inside of a bowl. Most cutting tools, such as scrapers, only cut top down. As soon as the tool crosses the center point, the cutting edge of the tool is no longer engaged, making it difficult to get a clean cut at the center.

The solution is to make a tool that can cut the wood in both directions, from the top down and from the bottom up. The tool is simply moved to the left and right of the center point of the box or bowl, eliminating a dimple.

Grind the cutting edge of a skew chisel to a round profile like a round-nose scraper. I reground a 1" (2.5 cm-) wide skew and put a 2" (5 cm) radius on the cutting edge.


