Joe McGill had these huge logs lying around his house. He offered them to me. I cannot say no to wood, especially free wood. So I went out and got the biggest chain-saw they make, 9hp. It came



with a 59" bar. So I bought the Alaskan chain saw mill (**Granberg International**). Well I needed a different bar and chain for a rip cut. So I got a 64" bar. The beauty of this bar, I can add another motor to it, so two motors on



this bar brings it up to a 18hp chainsaw. Think of the possibilities, more power. This baby makes my 18" Husqvarna look like a cereal box toy. At 9hp it can cut a 48" by 8' diameter log in about 4 minutes. Joe and I, think by adding the second motor you could cut as fast as you walk. While this is a nasty looking chain, with really big teeth and was flying around the bar, Steve



Reznek came to mind. What would the safety officer say about this? I think Steve would have had a heart attack!

Tuning Fran's Longworth Chuck

I have got to admit that Fran's Longworth chucks are things of beauty and his generosity in time and expense in making them available to the club members is significant (I am convinced that he lost money on the project).

After mounting mine on a lathe, I noticed that the two segments moved pretty well but determined to see if I could make the movement a little smoother. I removed the rubber bumpers and then the nut from the carriage bolt in the center, thus separating the two segments. I applied two coats of Boston's Butcher's Wax and inserted and brass washer on the carriage bolt before reassembling the chuck. I do not know if it was the washer or the butcher's wax (never introduce two variables at the same time!) but one way or the other the segments now move very smoothly.




Bob Leonard is the owner and he has developed a business of re-building as necessary and re-purposing high quality industrial grade Gast and Thomas pumps used in the medical field. He offers options that essentially are parts that you assemble, to a fully assembled set-up that is basically ready to use, all within the \$165-\$300 range.

I purchased one and am more than pleased with the performance. It will get more use than I thought. He offers very clear assembly instructions and directions on building various size chucks to fit your needs. He provides a one year warranty and his customer service is excellent. Anyone looking for a vacuum chuck should definitely check this out. The website is www.frugalvacuumchuck.com and contains directions and videos.


